Building Momentum

LINKages Society builds thriving intergenerational communities in Calgary and area, traditional lands of the proud Treaty 7 people: the Blackfoot of Siksika, Piikani, and Kainai Nations, the Tsuut'ina, Stoney Nakoda tribes, and the Metis Nation, Region 3.

Just as we have been welcomed onto traditional lands, we also seek to welcome into our growing community people of all ages from different regions, provinces, and countries. Intergenerational connections form the foundations of strong and thriving communities, for as we learn to celebrate the diversity, knowledge, and strength of other generations, we become stronger ourselves.

It is from this foundational belief that LINKages' programs and connections continue to grow.

It is becoming more recognized both in research and practice that longer term intergenerational connections result in a myriad of positive outcomes both for seniors and youth.

- Increased healthy social connections for seniors increase their life expectancy, physical and mental health improves, and the onset of diseases such as dementia are delayed.
- For youth, social/emotional skills and confidence improve, volunteerism increases, mental health and feelings of belonging are improved, and youth grow naturally into fully trained age-friendly and dementia-friendly citizens.

In response to increased need and demand from the surrounding community, nation, and international community, LINKages is preparing for growth. Existing school and community programs continue to evolve based on participant feedback, outcomes, and community need. New programs are being developed to support more diverse communities and new communities around the country and globe who recognize the positive impact of intentional and purpose-driven intergenerational programming. LINKages has branched out into "Train the Trainer" programs (IG T4T) to begin building capacity across the province and nation.

As we move forward, we wish to acknowledge and appreciate all of our amazing community and funding partners, and our incredible staff and volunteers. Your strength is our strength - the collaborative and solution-focused spirit that we experience everywhere is key to our success!

Calgary After School Programs

Intergenerational (IG) After School provides opportunities for vulnerable Calgary youth aged 12-18 to connect with trained senior mentors throughout the school year. Senior mentors are pre-trained by the program facilitator to support vulnerable youth to achieve the 4 main program goals of confidence, interpersonal skills, responsible decision making, and natural supports. Programming is sequenced, interactive and fun, building on relationship and learning. Thank you to the City of Calgary FCSS for their ongoing generous support.

Community Initiatives

Thanks to funding from the **United Way**, we continue to deepen partnerships in 5 Calgary communities.

Community programs build capacity by leveraging the strengths of seniors and youth within their own communities. LINKages accomplishes this through mediums such as art-based programs and community-driven events such as BBQs.

Community programs provide support to approximately 400 seniors annually.

The Year Ahead

As we look ahead to LINKages' 25th Anniversary year, we realize there is much to celebrate!

The passionate hard work of dozens of dedicated LINKages' staff, community agency partners, funders, and hundreds of volunteers have brought the agency to this impressive milestone. We hope to celebrate with many former staff and volunteers over the coming year!

Moving forward, the implementation of new and re-newed programs will evolve to better serve the needs arising in Calgary and surrounding communities:

- **Calgary After School** - Funding from the City of Calgary FCSS and Rogers Community Grants will enable the pilot of a new Calgary After School program in Greater Forest Lawn. Local seniors will mentor and learn together with community youth in fun and interactive weekly sessions focused on social/emotional learning and community strengths.
- **IG Outreach** - Funding from the Province of Alberta's Community Initiatives Program (CIP) will renew LINKages' outreach program, which pairs university and college-aged youth partners with isolated seniors throughout the city. The focus is on building long-term positive relationships and supporting seniors to become more active and connected in their own communities.
- **Rural LINK** - Funding from the Ministry of Seniors Aging Well Grant program will help launch at least 3 rural chapters of LINKages across the province with more to come in following years. Isolated communities will receive focused training and support to leverage existing opportunities for intergenerational community building.
- **Board Development** - Funding from CIP will allow the Board to prepare for organizational growth by accessing focused training and support throughout the coming year.
- **Project Inspire** - Collaborating with the Calgary Chinese Elderly Citizens Association and the Greater Forest Lawn 55+ Society, LINKages is honoured to partner together to pilot intergenerational and intercultural arts-based skill-building programs over the next two years.

We look forward to working with our wonderful partner agencies and to continue expanding knowledge and impact of intergenerational programming.
